THE PRESIDENT

Dear members and friends of SRUK,

What a year it's been! I look back to the past few months and I am amazed by the number of initiatives that we have achieved. They could not have been possible without the hard work and enthusiasm of the more than 150 SRUK volunteers, including the 17 members of the directive board. We have all put everything into realising the aims and vision that we planned for this year and the result is, in my opinion, a complete success.

I have extremely enjoyed chairing this Society during this crucial year. We have grown in number of members, events, impact and funding. Our overall aim for this year was to consolidate SRUK in the UK, a challenge that has many times proven rather complicated. However, I am very pleased to say that currently, we are placed at a privilege position, sitting at the interface between European and British institutions. We hold the key of issues that affect our stability in this country. I am of course speaking about Brexit, a process that is bringing quite a lot of uncertainty into our lives and with the potential to have enormous impact in our careers. However, SRUK has taken Brexit as an opportunity to get our voices heard in the UK. Through hard work and professionalism, I believe we are an appreciated community that adds value to the already rich world of British learnt Societies.

This annual report includes the different initiatives and events that SRUK has done over the past 12 months. I would like to nevertheless take this opportunity to highlight our main achievements:

- We have organized more than 60 events, promoted scientific fields that are underrepresented in SRUK, such as engineering and social sciences and for the first time, our Annual Symposium has been held outside London and more than 100 people attended the event in Glasgow.
- We have hosted more than 20 professional development workshops and have organized 5 large-scale outreach events that have targeted hundreds of people. In addition, we have launched the 1st edition of "Science-me a Story", a contest of short scientific story for children.
- Our brand new website has been used to improve networking between our members and corporative partners.
- We have awarded 10 Travel Grants, the 3rd Emerging Talent Award, the Merit Award and are working on the 2nd Young Basque Investigator Award.
- We have launched the 1st round of the "UAM/SRUK Summer Studentships" in collaboration with Erasmus+ and the Autonomous University of Madrid.
- SRUK participated in different events during the **Spanish State Visit**.

- We have developed collaborations with The Russell Group, BEIS, Universities UK and UKRO, regarding Brexit. We have provided 2 evidence reports to the Science and Technology Committee. The reports build on results obtained in our surveys. Importantly, I proudly represented SRUK during the Brexit, Science and Innovation Summit.
- In Spain, we are pushing hard to improve our research system.
- To promote the Women in Science we have created a brand new committee: **Wo/men, Equity and Research.** Also, to commemorate the 11th February, we hosted the twitter campaign "#MiCientíficaFavorita" (*My Favorite Female Scientist*) and organized 5 workshops.
- Our mentoring programme, currently running with 40 pairs, has been accredited by the **European Council for Mentoring and Coaching.**
- A new target network of Engineers has been launched.
- We have increased our budget and raised over £80K. We welcome a new main supporter, *Fundación Lilly*.

As you can see, amazing things have been going on during this last year and none of them could have been possible without the more than 150 volunteers of SRUK. I have deeply enjoyed working with the 16 Directors that build the board. As a special mention, I am grateful to "my right hand" and vice-president, Javier Escudero, for his continues support, drive and enthusiasm to deliver the set challenges. We have worked together to continue the mission and successes of the previous board chaired by María Jiménez Sánchez and those who committed at different times during the last 6 years to build this Society.

I would like to say a huge thank you to all our sponsors and collaborators, in particular to *Fundación Ramón Areces*, *Fundación Banco Santander*, Spanish Embassy in London, the Spanish Foundation for Science and Technology, *Fundación Lilly*, and Bizkaia Talent, for giving us the tools to bring our vision and initiatives to life. We could not have done it without you.

From a personal point of view, I am deeply emotional and happy to have contributed to this beautiful project. I am extremely grateful for this opportunity and immensely proud to have represented this amazing group of people during 2017/18. I am in not doubt certain that I leave SRUK in the best possible hands with a board of directors fully energized and committed to continue the consolidation of SRUK. I will admire with pride the work done and the success that the new board will for sure achieve in the years to come. WHAT IS SRUK AND WHAT ARE OUR AIMS?

The Society of Spanish Researchers in the United Kingdom (SRUK) is a non-profit, independent organization.

We do not have any political affiliation.

SRUK was created in July 2011 and was formally established in June 2012. At that time, SRUK was registered in the Company's House of England and Wales.

The Society was created with four main aims:

1

SOCIAL NETWORK

To create a social network of researchers and students working in the United Kingdom. We aim to facilitate the arrival of the new members, offer advice, and share professional and life experiences.

2

SCIENCE COMMUNICATORS

To increase public awareness of every aspect of the Research and Innovation (R&I) system. We aim to close the existing gap between researchers and the general public by holding seminars, roundtables, conferences and the Society's annual symposium.

3

SCIENCE REPRESENTATIVES

To be the representatives of the Spanish researchers in the United Kingdom for British and Spanish organizations, general public and the media. We aim to serve as scientific advisors for both public and private organizations. We believe that our knowledge and experience are relevant and worth sharing.

4

SCIENCE MEDIATORS

To facilitate collaborations between both private and public British and Spanish R&I institutions. It is our opinion that exploring and establishing collaboration between the UK and Spain will bear fruit in the long run.

¿ QUÉ ES CERU Y CUÁLES SON NUESTROS OBJETIVOS?

La Sociedad de Científicos Españoles en Reino Unido (CERU) es una organización independiente sin ánimo de lucro y sin afiliación política. Se creó en julio del 2011 y se constituyó de manera oficial en junio del 2012. La sociedad persigue cuatro objetivos principales:

- 1. Crear una red social de investigadores que trabajan en el Reino Unido.
- 2. Acercar la ciencia al público en general.
- 3. Ser los portavoces de los científicos españoles en Reino Unido ante instituciones británicas y españolas, medios de comunicación y redes sociales.
- 4. Facilitar colaboraciones entre organizaciones relacionadas con la I+D+i del Reino Unido y de España, tanto públicas como privadas.

OUR STRUCTURE

SRUK is run by volunteers.

During 2017/2018, more than 150 members have actively participated in departments, committees and working groups, which have made possible the Society as it is today.

As in previous years, we have grown, achieved goals and consolidated ourselves as a key "player" Society within Spain and the UK.


SRUK is managed by the Board of Directors, which is elected during the Annual General Assembly. The Board is formed by 17 members representing SRUK members, pursuing the aims of the Society and defining the strategic plan for the coming years. In addition, SRUK is organized in eight Regional Constituencies across the UK and the directors of these constituencies are also part of the Board. This facilitates the direct communication between members and the Board.

Many volunteers are part of working groups and committees. Each constituency has a **Local Working Group** to shape regional activities and events. SRUK also runs with four departments: International Collaborations, Science Policy, Press and Online. In addition, **SRUK Committees** work to achieve specific goals of the society. Currently, SRUK has six committees: Fellowships; Scientific; International Symposium; Awards; Mentoring; and Wo/men, Equity and Research.

ESTRUCTURA DE CERU


OUR MEMBERS

Initiatives in Spain

The SPC has focused on promoting the R&I recommendations report that SRUK published in September 2015 for the Spanish general elections to all major political parties. We also provided feedback to the draft of the national plan on R&I published in July 2017 by the Secretaría de Estado de Investigación, Desarrollo e Innovación. We analysed the manifestos of the main Spanish political parties after the first 100 days of the current Parliament and we published an opinion article 'Volver a casa (solo) por Navidad' in El País, where the lack of attractiveness of the Spanish R&I system to researchers working abroad was reviewed. We have also been active in gathering opinions of researchers in Spain about Brexit. To do so, we ran a survey during CienciaUK17.

Initiatives in the UK

The SPC has continued monitoring the uncertainties caused by Brexit and communicating some of the key developments in this area to the members of SRUK through the Brexit Watch section of our newsletter. SRUK ran a second edition of the survey of Brexit among our members and SRUK issued the statement 'Time for Science and Innovation to remain at the heart of the Brexit process' on the anniversary of the triggering of Article 50. We also have gathered case-studies.

The Committee has also supported SRUK in keeping close contact with key institutions and learned societies of the British science and technology system.



EL COMITÉ DE POLÍTICA CIENTÍFICA (CPC)

El CPC de CERU ha seguido trabajando para mantener el interés en España por nuestro 'Informe de recomendaciones sobre la I+D'. Para ello, miembros del CPC se han reunido con representantes en materia de ciencia de los diferentes grupos parlamentarios en el Congreso. Además, el CPC proporcionó comentarios al borrador del plan nacional de I+D presentado en julio 2017. En el Reino Unido, SRUK ha reeditado la encuesta sobre los posibles efectos del Brexit en nuestros miembros. Los resultados de esta encuesta se emplearon para proporcionar evidencia al comité de ciencia y tecnología del parlamento británico. Como resultado, SRUK fue invitado a una cumbre sobre el Brexit organizada por dicha comisión y ha fortalecido contactos con instituciones con el Russell Group y el Departamento del gobierno británico encargado de gestionar la investigación y universidades.

INSTITUTIONAL LINKS

Spanish State Visit

During the State Visit of the King and the Queen of Spain in July 2017, SRUK had the opportunity to meet them in a coffee meeting at the Crick Institute. During this event, we communicated our concerns regarding the situation of the Spanish Research System and also about Brexit. We introduced the King and the Queen to the Program MILLA as a project that will favour the collaboration of the UK and Spain.

Science and Technology Committee (Commons) - UK Parliament

SRUK was the only non-British institution invited to a Summit organised by the Science & Technology Committee (S&TC) of the House of Commons of the UK Parliament in London on the 22nd of February 2018. This Summit followed the submission of a report where we communicated the results of our survey on Brexit. In the submission, we reported the concerns of SRUK members on Brexit and proposed measures to mitigate those risks. SRUK was one of the few actors of the British R&I system to take part in the Brexit Science and Innovation Summit, which was the round up event of the inquiry previously launched by the S&TC with the aim to identify actions needed now to mitigate risks and make the most of the opportunities for UK science, research and innovation after Brexit. The attendance to this summit enabled further contacts between SRUK and representatives for major British science organisations.

SRUK has also kept in close contact with institutions such as the Russell Group and the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy, from which the Ministry of State for Universities and Science depends, to foster bilateral collaborations in support of the R&I system in the UK.

To achieve this goal, agreements will focus on two key aspects:

- To provide a collaboration platform that will enhance visibility of research groups and raise awareness of potential partners (through a shared database and networking events between SRUK and Spanish institutions).
- 2. To facilitate bi-directional mobility of researchers in order to improve career development and attract talent to Spain.

Partnerships and Collaborations:

During the last couple of years, SRUK has signed different agreements with several Spanish institutions (Red de Universidades Valencianas por el fomento de la I+D - RUVID; Fundación Instituto de Investigación Sanitaria de Aragón – IIS Aragón; Instituto de Investigaciones Biomédicas de Málaga – IBIMA; Consejo Superior de Investigaciones Científicas – CSIC; Conferencia de Rectores de las Universidades Españolas – CRUE; Asociación Española de Investigación sobre el Cáncer – ASEICA). Since July 2017, new agreements have been reached leading to different activities:

- Asociación Española de Investigación sobre el Cáncer (Spanish Association of Cancer Research - ASEICA). Our agreement with ASEICA enhances visibility of research groups related to cancer investigation between Spain and the UK. Therefore, different approaches have been developed: i) webinars on cutting-edge topics in cancer research (e.g. 'Defeating cancer using the immune system'); and ii) a reduced registration fee for SRUK members to attend ASEICA conferences.
- Fundación Damián Rodríguez Olivares (Fundación DRO).
 Our agreement aims to promote scientific entrepreneurship and knowledge transfer between academia and industry with professional development webinars such as 'From the lab to the market').

DEPARTAMENTO DE RELACIONES INTERNACIONALES

SRUK/CERU tiene como un objetivo fundacional ser intermediario de la Ciencia y para ello ha buscado y busca establecer acuerdos con instituciones científicas españolas. Estos convenios quieren estimular colaboraciones entre España y Reino Unido que promuevan la movilidad entre ambos países. Hasta el momento, SRUK/CERU ha firmado acuerdos entre otros con la Red de Universidades Valencianas por el fomento de la I+D, el Consejo Superior de Investigaciones Científicas, la Conferencia de Rectores de las Universidades Españolas, la Asociación Española de Investigación sobre el Cáncer, la Universidad Autónoma de Madrid, la Real Sociedad Española de Física y la Fundación DRO. Durante el próximo año, seguiremos estableciendo convenios con distintas instituciones y continuaremos con nuestros programas de movilidad internacional entre España y Reino Unido.

- Real Sociedad Española de Física (Spanish Royal Society of Physics – RSEF). In April 2018, the event 'A morning of Physics' where distinguish researchers discussed the current challenges of the research of physical forces. This event was funded and hosted by Fundación Ramón Areces in Madrid.
- Universidad Autónoma de Madrid (Autonomous University of Madrid UAM). In collaboration with UAM, we have launched the first 'UAM/SRUK Summer Studentships' to support the visit of undergraduate/masters students from the UAM to research groups in the UK during summer 2018.

Furthermore, we have established and we are establishing further collaborations with different Spanish organizations to develop several activities (Fundación Pública Andaluza para la Investigación Biosanitaria Andalucía Oriental, International Mentoring Foundation for the Advancement of Higher Education, Universidad de La Coruña, etc.) and during this year we hope to launch our programme "SRUK On the Move" providing bi-directional mobility fellowships between the UK and Spanish Universities.

Making SRUK world-wide known

The SRUK Online department is responsible of **all SRUK online communications**, from our website to our social media. Our goal is to keep our members updated with all the events and initiatives organized by our society. We also work to increase SRUK worldwide visibility through **Internet and social media**.

This department is composed of 21 volunteers, known as community managers, some of whom are regional ones, responsible for advertising events taking place in their constituency. All community managers work in a daily basis to manage the following:

- 1. SRUK website: We are in charge of the management of our new website, launched in July 2017. The new website has enabled our members to be updated with the latest events, manage their membership profile and finances and register to new initiatives and programs. It has also improved our visibility and reputation to both internal and external audiences. News from Researchers to Society

The Press Department works to improve the visibility of SRUK initiatives. Formed by an enthusiastic team of volunteers, it serves as a link between SRUK members, constituencies and departments with the media and the public. We act as main point of contact for journalist at local, national and international level.

From June 2017, the Press Department has issued (alone or in coordination with partner institutions) 12 press releases covering from the V Anniversary Seminar Series and our Annual Symposium to initiatives such as the SRUK Emerging Talent and the Young Basque Investigation Award. This year, SRUK appeared in the media more than 100 times, including general and specialized press, radio, television and digital media.



The Press department does not only promote our Society activities but is also in charge of disseminating the research of our more than 650 members. In the last year, our researchers' achievements have been covered by the media more than 40 times. In addition, as part of SRUK outreach program, the Press Department produces the SRUK blog 1,2,3... Explore! And the radio program "En Fase Experimental". Our fortnightly radio program includes the latest scientific news and interviews to researchers, serving as the perfect platform to reach the general public. We are present in iVoox and iTunes platforms, where our programs have reached more than 1800 listenings. Our loyal audience comes from Spain, UK and even Japan! Likewise, the SRUK Blog 1,2,3... Explore! helps to disseminate the research made by SRUK members, also improving their communication and outreach skills in English and Spanish. Since our integration in the new SRUK website we have received more than 6000 visitors. Our posts cover broad topics from dating Palaeolithic art to the use of maths in measuring urban pollution. Physics, Chemistry, Engineering, Biosciences, Social Sciences, History and other topics are welcome!

Last but not least, the Press Department organises webinars in Science Communication to broad researchers' skills in these areas (public engagement, science communication and social media).

We still have many goals to reach! The SRUK Press Department aims to potentiate the visibility of SRUK in the British media and to build a solid communication strategy for SRUK in collaboration with the Online and Communication Department.

CIENCIA UK 2017



In 2017, SRUK returned to Madrid in November to provide young researchers and students with a view of the professional opportunities in science that the UK offers. In "CienciaUK 2017", SRUK gathered together more than 100 people in *Fundación Ramón Areces*. Talks from speakers gave insightful examples of the research career paths in the UK, both in academia and in other science-related jobs, covering a wide range of case studies: from working in industry to science policy or from business development to science diplomacy. This event, which has now been celebrated in Madrid for 4 consecutive years, will continue to bring innovative approaches to foster professional development of Spanish young researchers.

TARGET NETWORKS

Discussing one's experiences and sharing opportunities with other members in the same situation is very useful for professional development. For this reason, we have launched a new program, Target Networks, to create specific groups that members can join according to their interests.

In October 2017, the Target Network for Engineering began as a forum to facilitate engineers' connections and collaborations, to enhance interaction between engineers in Industry and Academia, and to open a space for discussion. We launched a cycle of conferences entitled "The future of...", which will take place in different constituencies, aiming to increase awareness about Engineering across SRUK members, and invite engineers all over the UK to participate. The talks are carried out in a friendly and relaxed atmosphere on a social location, and explore the trends in different fields of engineering from both academic and industrial perspectives.

The first event of this series took place in March in London, and attracted nearly 40 attendees who had the opportunity to discover and discuss the future of Medical Electronics. Dr Melpomeni Kalofonou, Research Fellow at Imperial Col-

lege, explained how tiny microchips are being used to detect cancer, unveiling the potential of these technology for the next generation of diagnostic platforms. Then, Dr Miguel Silviera, cofounder of Aidicare, presented recent developments on medical wearables in Industry, providing an overview of the possibilities - and challenges - that our health data has to improve our lifestyle and wellbeing.

EL PROGRAMA DE MENTORING

CERU es consciente de los problemas que los investigadores españoles enfrentan al desarrollar su carrera profesional en el Reino Unido y por ello hemos diseñado un programa de mentoring con el objetivo de ayudar a maximizar sus oportunidades y planificar una carrera exitosa. La primera edición del programa comenzó en agosto de 2016 con 22 parejas mentor-mentee que desarrollaron su relación de mentoring a lo largo de un año, de las cuales 9 decidieron continuar otro año mas. La segunda edición del programa comenzó en noviembre de 2017 con 28 nuevas parejas y algunas novedades en el registro y seguimiento para mejorar el funcionamiento del programa y las parejas. Se ha impartido un curso de formación gratuito y obligatorio para los nuevos participantes y se ha proporcionado documentación para ayudarles a construir relaciones de mentoring más fluidas y fructíferas. Se han ofertado bolsas de viaje para dar la oportunidad de conocerse a mentor y mentee, así como un premio de reconocimiento a los mentores más excepcionales. La nueva edición del programa comenzará en noviembre de 2018.

SRUK is aware of the issues that most Spanish researchers will face when developing their research career in the UK. Along a career-building path, it is necessary to acquire additional skills and expertise to plan next steps, to learn how to manage and collaborate with students, colleagues and collaborators.

We have designed a mentoring scheme to help and support our members to maximize their opportunities and plan a successful career path. The SRUK Mentoring Programme benefits from the diverse range of members' skills and fields of expertise, as well as from their previous working experience in the British, Spanish and other international systems. Mentors encourage, guide and support less experienced members, the mentees, to maximize their potential, develop their skills and guide them in their careers. The first edition of the mentoring programme started in September 2016 with 22 pairs mentor-mentee, matched according to their research area and expertise, as well as development needs and career ambitions of the mentee. Following the success of the first edition, we opened a new edition that started in November 2017 with 28 new mentee pairs. The SRUK Mentoring Committee have offered free and mandatory training for mentors and mentees in a webinar format. We have also provided mentors and mentees with tips for mentees that can help to make the mentoring meetings more dynamic and productive and will help them to define the support they want to receive. SRUK offers Travel awards covering the mentee or mentor's travelling expenses for face to face meetings. SRUK also wants to recognize the effort and the relevant role of mentors in this Programme. Therefore, at the end of the first year of relationship, mentees were asked to nominate their mentors for a Mentor Recognition Award and six mentors that offered an outstanding performance received the award. Nominations for the second edition of Mentor Recognition Awards will open in September 2018.

The two first editions of the SRUK Mentoring Programme has been a complete success, which has encouraged us to work on the new edition that **will kick off in November 2018**, stay tuned for updates!

Recognising and fostering Spanish talent in the UK

Currently, SRUK has three awards that acknowledge the outstanding work of researchers at different stages of their career. In 2017, we launched the first edition of the SRUK Young Basque Investigator Award Bizkaia Talent. In 2018, we launched the third edition of the Emerging Talent Award with the support of *Fundación Banco Santander*. We also run the biannual SRUK Merit Award recognising excellent research trajectories of Spanish researchers in the UK.

The Young Basque Investigator Award, funded by Bizkaia Talent in collaboration with SRUK, aims to recognize and support the professional career of young Basque researchers who carry out their research activity in the United Kingdom.

In the first edition, the awardees were **Dr Naiara Rodríguez Flórez, Dr José Ignacio Aizpurua Unanue** and **Dr Eneko Axpe Iza.**

Dr Naiara Rodríguez Flórez (Imperial College London) won the first award (5000€). She works on the development of new techniques to improve the treatment of newborns with craniofacial anomalies and used the money of this award to present her results at the prestigious biannual conference of the International Society of Craniofacial Surgery (ISCF) in Mexico.

Dr José Ignacio Aizpurua Unanue (University of Strathclyde, Glasgow) won the second award (1000€). José Ignacio works on the design of prediction and diagnosis models for electrical component failures and he invested the money of the award in funding a stay in Glasgow of one of his PhD students from the University of Mondragón.

Dr Eneko Axpe Iza (University of Cambridge), a researcher in biomaterials and tissue engineering, also won the second award (1000€). With the award, he held the "Developing new materials for tissue engineering" workshop in November 2017 in Bilbao with the attendance of international prestigious researchers.

We are very pleased to introduce Prof Mercedes Maroto-Valer as the 2018 SRUK Merit Awardee. The aim of this award is to recognise the career of a researcher who has had a prominent role in the advancement of research and has promoted scientific collaborations between Spain and the UK.

Professor Mercedes Maroto-Valer (FRSE, FIChemE, FRSC, FRSA, CEng)

Prof Mercedes Maroto-Valer (FRSE, FIChemE, FRSC, FRSA) is Assistant Deputy Principal (Research & Innovation) and Director of the Research Centre for Carbon Solutions (RCCS) at Heriot-Wat University.

She started her studies in Chemical Engineering at the University of Basque Country and obtained her PhD at the University of Strathclyde (Scotland). After working in the United States for 7 years at the Centre for Applied Energy Research (University of Kentucky), and at the Pennsylvania State University, she joined the University of Nottingham as Reader in 2005 and within 3 years she was promoted to Professor in Energy Technologies. During her time at Nottingham she was Head of the Energy and Sustainability Research Division at the Faculty of Engineering.

She joined Heriot-Watt University in 2012 as the first Buchan Chair in Sustainable Energy Engineering and she has been Director of the cross-university Energy Academy and Head of the Institute of Mechanical, Process and Energy Engineering. Currently, she is the Director of the Research Centre for Carbon Solutions (RCCS), a world leading engineering centre focused on delivering innovation for the wider deployment of carbon dioxide capture, storage and utilization technologies. She has been awarded a prestigious European Research Council (ERC) Advanced Award, leading a team that develops novel solutions to meet the worldwide strive for energy, with particular emphasis on clean technologies, including carbon dioxide capture, transport, storage and utilization. She has over 440 publications, and 32% of her publications are in top 10% most cited worldwide. She holds leading positions in professional societies and editorial boards and has received numerous international prizes and awards, including 2013 Hong-Kong University Mong Distinguished Fellowship, 2011 RSC Environment, Sustainability and Energy Division Early Career Award, 2009 Philip Leverhulme Prize, 2005 US Department of Energy Award for Innovative Development.

In her acceptance speech during the VI International Symposium, Prof Maroto-Valer emphasised the importance of investing in science and technology, international collaborations, and recognising the achievements of women in research.

The prize consists of £14,000 to be invested in the development of the awardee's career, such as research-related tasks, dissemination of recent results, specialised training or family arrangements. This award also seeks to increase the visibility of the winner's research to both British and Spanish societies.

Dr David FairénJiménez developed his scientific career in Spain, the UK and the United States, before settling in the United Kingdom in late 2012 as a Royal Society University Research Fellow at the University of Cambridge. He currently directs the

Adsorption and Advanced Materials

Laboratory in the Department of Chemical Engineering and Biotechnology at the University of Cambridge. He has published more than 70 scientific articles and he has filed five patents. He is also founder and director of Immaterial Labs Ltd and Tarsis Technologies Ltd. In 2016, he received a Consolidator Grant from the European Research Council.

His group is an international reference for the design and development of new materials. His work combines the use of supercomputers to predict, simultaneously, the performance of thousands of materials in each application with the synthesis of the best candidates in the laboratory. In addition, David is a perfect example of how basic research has a beneficial impact on the society, as shown by the combination of lab work with its commercial development. David will use the prize to improve the intelectual property of the spin-out Company Immaterial and to improve work/family balance.

We received 12 high-quality applications that have been assessed by the designated scientific panel. Based on their evaluations, the awardee was ratified by a jury composed by representatives of SRUK, the Emerging Talent Award evaluation panel, the *Fundación Banco Santander*, *Fundación Ramón Areces*, the Spanish Foundation for Science and Technology (FECYT), and the Office of Cultural and Scientific Affairs of the Embassy of Spain in the United Kingdom.

One more year, we got together to share our work with other members in our Annual International Symposium

The symposium, held in London the 7-9th of July 2017, celebrated the V anniversary of the Society and was attended by more than 170 people.

The Symposium started at the Spanish Embassy in London with a lecture by the first Spanish astronaut, **Pedro Duque**, who explained the current possibilities for the realization of experiments in microgravity. The neuroscientist **Mara Dierssen** (Centre for Genomic Research), an expert on intellectual disabilities such as Down syndrome, remarked the value of basic research in order to "find treatments and improve diseases symptoms in the long term."

The V Symposia of SRUK brought together **Carmen Vela**, the Spanish State Secretary for Research, Development and Innovation; **Carlos Bastarreche Sagües**, H.E. The Ambassador of Spain in the UK, and **Raimundo Pérez-Hernández y Torra**, Director of *Fundación Ramón Areces*, who highlighted the relevance of scientific advances and discoveries in today's society and the work of SRUK.

The main venue of the Symposium was Queen Mary University of London, where the researchers presented their latest results and discussed the role of science in society in order to solve the Global Challenges that humanity is facing. In this regard, Jonathan Davis, from Montfort University and an expert on sustainable cities, has said: "austerity takes time and headspace" and "the permanent dispossession of a majority provokes outbursts of citizen fury". In a debate with Jenny Nelson, from Imperial College and Renewable Energy expert, Natasha Howard, London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and expert on epidemics such as Ebola, and Marta G. Rivera-Ferre, doctor of the University of Vic and expert in sustainable agriculture, the researchers highlighted the challenges humanity is facing at the global level and how scientists can meet the challenges of the 21st century and how to find the

Pere Estupinya, expert in scientific outreach and Katherine Mathieson, of the British Science Association, discussed how to transmit the scientific knowledge of researchers to get better communication with society in order to influence political and strategic decisions. They, together with Pablo Barrecheguren, Helena Gonzalez-Burón, Antonio Calvo Roy and Susana de Lucas discussed about the key role science communication should have on our community and made the audience laugh. The first two belong to Big Van Scientist on Wheels, which tries to bring science to lay audiences using humour. They also provided feedback to the 8 selected short talks.

The importance of diversity in Science was discussed by **Eulalia Pérez Sedeño** (CSIC) who explained the possible solutions for tackling the gender bias, and finally, **Claire McNulty** (British Council) talked about the potential challenges and opportunities that British scientific system may face after the result of the EU referendum and explained the future recommendations for UK-EU relationships in Europe.

The symposium also included four professional development workshops: Use of Scientific Monologue as a science outreach tool (by **BigVan**), Creativity in research (by **Seisques**), Scientific Entrepeneurship (by **NIMGenetics**) and training How to shape a competitive proposal (ERC & MSCA) (by **FECYT**).

Also during the Symposium, we held our Society's Annual General Meeting (AGM). Here, the 2016-2017 President María Jiménez, Vice-President Estrella Luna, Secretary Rocío Gaudioso and the Treasurer Francesc Coll, presented an update of all initiatives, events and budget of the past year. To conclude the AGM, the new Board of Directors was elected.



Promoting gender equity and diversity in research

In December 2017, this committee was established to work on three key aspects:

1. To raise awareness of the role of women in research. In partnership with 11febrero.org, SRUK celebrated the International Day of Women and Girls in Science. Five events took place in different constituencies during February 2018 to give visibility to the work of women in science as well as their leadership and management skills.

2. To promote women professional development.

A series of webinars to promote the **professional career development** of women in science were launched to focus on those aspects that are limiting women's progression to senior positions in science. These include **leadership** skills, **imposter syndrome**, **unconscious bias** and the impact of **career breaks**, among other topics.


3. To support a work-family balance.

SRUK Wo/Men Survey 2018

Building up on the 2016 Athena Survey of Science, Engineering and Technology (ASSET) designed by the Equality Challenge Unit (ECU) and distributed to UK higher education institutions, the SRUK Wo/Men committee launched a survey aiming to collect the perception and experience in gender equality of Spanish female and male researchers from any country in the world.

This survey was open to any Spanish researcher working at a university or research centre in Spain or any other country worldwide. **The more than 1,500 responses** collected will provide invaluable data that will facilitate recognising areas for future work.

Plans 2018/2019

During the second half of 2018, we will organise more scientific seminars such as "Science in the Pub", as well as an event focused on "Science and Mental Health". Events 2017/2018

The London constituency was heavily involved in the organisation of the successful SRUK V Anniversary International Symposium, which gathered almost 200 people and attracted world-class speakers (see page 21). The 2017/2018 academic year has been a busy one for our constituency as we have organised a myriad of events devoted to both our members and the general members of the British society with an interest in science. In the social side of things, we organised a well attended Welcome Party for "New Londoners" in October 2017. We closed 2017 with the traditional festive "Christmas dinner". Our scientific events season started linking the arts and science, where the speakers explained the importance and overlapping of these two disciplines. The year 2018 started really strong with a "Science in the Pub", where three speakers coming from as diverse backgrounds as video-game design, phylogenetics, and fluid physics, explained in lay terms what their research or job was about. A really successful training course on "Scientific Computing" was delivered by members of our constituency, giving the basics of programming to both SRUK and non-SRUK members. We also partnered with other prestigious organisations to co-organise events such as the "Global Challenges Roundtable on Food Water and Heat sustainability", which took place at the London South Bank University. Additionally, we also partnered with the Cervantes Institute of London and the Scientific and Cultural Affairs of the Spanish Embassy to bring Prof Alicia Sintes to London to talk about "Gravitational Waves: This is how the University Sounds".

Covering both the earlier stages of education and the later stages of the scientific career, they gave a short talk, followed by a discussion where the attendees actively participated. As part of the activities of the International Day of Women and Girls in Science, we

organised a very successful guided tour entitled "Women that changed the world: pioneers in science and arts", where we walked through Oxford city centre, linking iconic places to women who made decisive contributions to science and arts.

We enjoyed Dr Rosario Rueda (University of Granada) seminar that took place during the summer in the **Seminar Series of Spanish Scientists visiting Oxford**. Rosario explained about how childhood poverty could affect the neuro-cognitive development of babies, emphasising the current figures of childhood poverty in Spain. At the beginning of 2018, we also held the 6th edition of our classic scientific **minisymposia**, where different members of the constituency presented their research in an informal but time-rigorous style. And a month later, Salvador Aznar gave a **pub seminar** on stem cells and the effect that the diet has in metastasis.

Plans 2018/2019

During the second half of 2018 we will organise a workshop about Statistics and Biology and another one based on the transition from Academia to the Industry. We will continue organising mini-symposia, scientific seminars and social events.

Plans 2018/2019

For next year, we keep having our informal talks "Pint of knowledge" and social activities such as a wine tasting and our traditional Summer BBQ.

This creates the perfect atmosphere to enable scientific discussion and engagement with talks from different disciplines.

Events 2017/2018

We have been very active last year and have organized multiple events of different kind. The most popular social event has been as always our **Summer BBQ**. The first seminar from this period was about the "**Impact of Research**" that we organized in collaboration with Hughes Hall College. We learned how to improve our research's impact thanks to Dr Richard van Noorden (Features editor at Nature), Dr Carlos Gómez (Head of Knowledge Transfer) and Dr Agnieszka Iwasiewicz (Knowledge Transfer Facilitator).

Plans 2018/2019

A visit to a local beer factory in Manchester will be our social event before summer. We will foster our collaboration with the Instituto Cervantes Manchester in co-organising scientific events. Also more bi-monthly Pint of Knowledge talks will follow; and furthermore we are planning to organise an event at Liverpool Albert Docks to meet Liverpool-based SRUK members and increase our visibility in other cities of the Constituency.

With the heart in Manchester, the North West Constituency covers all the area through Liverpool to Bangor. It currently has over 30 members. The Constituency is now led by a vibrant group of people from diverse scientific backgrounds with different ideas and curiosities as reflected in our activities.

Events 2017/2018

We are really excited with the initiatives we have launched this year so far! Firstly, we promoted the 1st edition of "Science-me a story", a writing contest of short scientific stories for children. We believe tales are a fantastic way to encourage children's curiosity and imagination. Awards include an economical prize and the publication of the stories on specialized outreach journals such as Principia (in the Spanish category).

Events 2017/2018

The constituency's activities in the 2017/2018 academic year were very diverse. Plans 2018/2019




Our income has slightly increased by 2.6% with respect to last year. Nevertheless, we continue operating with an efficient economic policy, that is, we try to make the most out of the income received.
