


1) Please indicate the country where you are currently working or your main institution is based












3) Please, indicate the type of centre or institution where you work







5) Have you ever studied or worked as a researcher (or are you currently studying or working as a researcher) outside Spain?



6) If you answered "Yes" to the question 5, is the United Kingdom within the countries you have studied or worked as a researcher?




7) Are you considering moving to the United Kingdom in the next two years?








8) If your answer to 7 was "Yes", has Brexit impacted your decision-making process?




9) If your answer to 8 was "No", has Brexit impacted your decision-making process?










10) Are you currently collaborating with any institution in the UK?


11) If you answered Yes to 10, do you think that Brexit will affect such collaborations?





13) Overall, from your perspective, how attractive is the United Kingdom now that the country is going through Brexit (compared to what your perspective was before the EU referendum)?









14) In these specific scenarios, from your perspective, how attractive would the United Kingdom be after Brexit (compared to what your perspective was before the EU referendum)?










15) From your perspective, what is the area that will be most affected by Brexit in the United Kingdom? (Only one option)




16) From your perspective, how will Brexit affect research in the rest of the European Union?








17) What areas (and how) will be affected by Brexit in the rest of the EU?


