We have grown in number of members, securing those that have been in the UK for long, while continuing delivering our flagship initiatives and events and strengthening our relationships with key actors in Spain and the United Kingdom. Through hard work and professionalism, and learning new ways of working, our Society has become a key player within the international research environment in both countries, minimising the impact of the current public health crisis and Brexit on our activities.

This annual report includes our work over the past 12 months. I sincerely hope that you will find these pages interesting and will enjoy reading what SRUK has been up to this year. I would like to highlight the following achievements:

- We have published our report "Por Un País Innovador", which features recommendations on the R&D system in Spain and we did a public presentation with partner organisations in Spain, as well as privately in meetings with political parties and officials from the Spanish Ministry of Science and Innovation and the Ministry of Universities.
- The Department of Science Policy had a major impact this year and published brief pieces about our main recommendations in outlets like **The Euroscientist and The Conversation** Spain, as well as a peer-reviewed policy memo on open science in the Journal of Science Policy and Governance.
- We have successfully launched the **2nd edition** of our **"SRUK On The Move"** programme, enabling researchers to visit groups abroad either in Spain or the UK. We have also offered once again our **"SRUK Students-hips"** for Spanish undergraduates.
- We have maintained our commitment to recognise the research excellence of our members and facilitate their development by running the 5th edition of the "SRUK Emerging Talent Award" and offering our first "SRUK Professional Development Grants".
- We have consolidated our outreach initiatives, running the 4th edition of our popular contest "Science-me a Story" with more than 200 submissions from all over the world, as well as our blog "1, 2, 3... Explore!" with 23 posts published this year and our radio programme "En Fase Experimental", that had over 1,000 monthly downloads. We also launched our first photography contest "Investigación EnFoco".

- We have successfully adapted to new ways of working and hosted several social events and online webinars, including our **first virtual Annual Symposium**, different **programming courses** and the **"Alternatives to Academia" series**, all uploaded in our YouTube channel and visited numerous times. We have participated once again in the events with the occasion of the **"International Day of Women and Girls in Science"**.
- We have monitored very closely the **effects of Brexit** on our members. We have run a last survey to understand the impact on our research community. We have continued our close collaboration with other European research diasporas to send a unified **#DealForscience** message to different institutions and key stakeholders. We have also taken part in **"Ponencia para el estudio de las consecuencias derivadas de la salida del Reino Unido de la Unión Europea"**, by the Spain's Congress of Deputies.
- Our **mentoring programme** keeps consolidating, currently facilitating **33 pairs** and continuing being an example of fostering good mentorship relationships.
- We have been working together with the rest of the societies that are part of the larger network that is **RAI-CEX**, generating several policy reports, such as our feedback to the roadmap for science in Spain. Together, we continue giving visibility to the research done by more than 3,600 members and to deliver this aim, we have hosted our first joint event with the support of the Ramón Areces Foundation.
- Last but not least, we have also revised our internal way of working. We have seeked professional help to revise the legal framework of our Society and generate an **updated version of the Articles of Association**. We have also renewed our website, with a new **Members' Zone** and exciting developments on our main site that are underway. And we have launched our **SRUK Instagram account** to have a closer and more personal liaison with our members.

SRUK volunteers have been very busy behind the scenes. Our more user-friendly website has helped our members to find and apply to our open calls and opportunities. We have also invested a lot of work in a more sustainable future for our Society, defined by good operations guidelines and a revision of both our legal and financial frameworks. We hope that these changes will bring a more robust infrastructure to help us continue growing and delivering our high impact initiatives. I would like to thank all our volunteers and Executive Committee, with a very special mention to Dr Javier Burgos, our Vice-president during this year, whose professionalism and support has been incredibly remarkable to go together through all the challenges we have faced. I would also like to express my deepest gratitude to our collaborators and sponsors, who have been incredibly supportive and accommodating our proposals in a year that has been fully virtual. In particular, I would like to acknowledge Fundación Ramon Areces, Fundación Banco Santander, the Spanish Embassy in London and its Office for Cultural and Scientific Affairs, Fundación Lilly and the Spanish Foundation for Science and Technology. Their continued support helps us to achieve our mission and make us very proud of sharing our passion for science and research with them.

Annual Report 2021

WHAT IS SRUK? WHAT ARE OUR AIMS?

SRUK was created in July 2011 and was formally established in June 2022. At that time, SRUK was registered in the Companies House of England and Wales. The Society was created with four main aims:

The Society of Spanish Reearchers in the United Kingdom (SRUK/CERU) is a non-profit, independent organization. We do not have any political affiliation.

1. SOCIAL NETWORK

To create a social network of researchers and students working in the United Kingdom. We aim to facilitate the arrival of the new members, offer advice, and share professional and life experiences.

2. SCIENCE COMMUNICATORS

To increase public awareness of every aspect of the Research and Innovation (R&I) system. We aim to close the existing gap between researchers and the general public by holding seminars, roundtables, conferences and the Society's annual symposium.

3. SCIENCE REPRESENTATIVES

To be the representatives of the Spanish researchers in the United Kingdom for British and Spanish organisations, general public, and the media. We aim to serve as scientific advisors for both public and private organisations. We believe that our knowledge and experience are relevant and woth sharing.

4. SCIENCE MEDIATORS

To facilitate collaborations between both private and public British and Spanish R&I institutions. It is our opinion that exploring and establishing collaboration between the UK and Spain will bear fruit in the long run.

¿QUÉ ES CERU Y CUÁLES SON NUESTROS OBJETIVOS?

La sociedad de Científicos Españoles en Reino Unido (SRUK/CERU) es una organización independiente sin ánimo de lucro y sin afiliación política. Se creó en 2011 y se constituyó de manera oficial en junio de 2012. La sociedad persigue cuatro objetivos principales:

- 1. Crear una red social de investigadores que trabajan en el Reino Unido.
- 2. Acercar la ciencia y la investigación al público en general.
- 3. Ser los portavoces de los investigadores españoles en Reino Unido ante instituciones británicas y españolas, medios de comunicación y redes sociales.
- 4. Facilitar colaboraciones entre organizaciones relacionadas con la I+D+i del Reino Unido y de España, tanto públicas como privadas.

OUR STRUCTURE

SRUK/CERU is run by volunteers. During 2020/2021 more than 100 members have actively participated in our departments, working groups and committees, which is what makes possible the Society as it is today.

SRUK/CERU is managed by the Executive Committee (EC), formed by 17 directors representing all our SRUK members. They work together to pursue the aims of the society and the different departments are elected during the Annual General Assembly. In addition, SRUK is organised in ten established Regional Constituencies across the UK, and the directors of these constituencies are also part of the EC and elected by their local members. This facilitates the direct communication between our members and the EC. We also count with Ambassadors in Spain, who are our main link and represent our members there.

Many volunteers are part of our departments, working groups and committees. SRUK counts with four departments: International Collaborations, Science Policy, Press and Communications. Also, each constituency has a Local Working Group to shape their regional activities and events. In addition, SRUK committees work to achieve specific goals of the Society. Currently, SRUK has nine committees: Fellowships



and Awards, Evaluation, International Symposium, Mentoring, Wom=en, equity and research, Cancer-ASEICA, Science-me a Story, En Foco and Design, together with the teams of the Blog, Radio, YouTube and Instagram, and the members of our Scientific Advisory Board.

As in previous years, we have grown, achieved goals, and consolidated ourselves as a key player within Spain and the UK. As always, we welcome any member interested in participating actively on board of our amazing team of volunteers.

ESTRUCTURA DE CERU



Type of regular membership



In the Science Policy Department, we identify and work with key stakeholders both in Spain and the UK - including researchers, officials, parliamentarians and the media - and seek to inform decisions with our reports and evidence submissions.

At SRUK, we have taken and continued to take an active role in defending the interests and rights of Spanish researchers - both during the Brexit negotiations and beyond. We also perform impartial analysis and provide recommendations to foster the Spanish R&D system, based on our perspective from within the British system.

We have established a good working relationship with journalists, officials and politicians. This year, our work has been featured in Research Fortnight, El País, Radio Exterior and Onda Cero, among other media.

In the UK

We continue to monitor the new regulations being rolled out in the UK that affect research and researchers, as well as their families and dependents. For instance, we published our **analysis and response to the UK Research and Development Roadmap** and to the **UK Points-Based Immigration System**.

We also published a new survey on the **impact of Brexit on Spanish researchers and students living in the UK**, which revealed increased uncertainty and lower appeal of the UK compared to previous surveys, and highlighted access to European funding as well as citizens' rights as prominent concerns of our community. We will continue to monitor the situation with new surveys as the UK's withdrawal from the EU has now become effective.

In January, given the importance of Brexit for our daily lives as UK residents, we organised a **Q&A event in collaboration with the Home Office and the Spanish Embassy**. More than 100 attendees were able to gain first-hand information and advice from officials, and we remain committed to fluid collaboration with our partners in the months to come.

In Spain

In September, we published our report "Por Un País Innovador", which features recommendations on funding and management, support structures, career support and transparency of selection processes - as well as a request for a political pledge on long-term R&D investment and strategy and a chapter on research culture.

This report was written by our Science Policy department with input and feedback from internal and external stakeholders at various stages of their research careers, and both from within and outside of academia.

The document was presented in a members-only preview and then in a public presentation with partner organisations in Spain, as well as privately in meetings with parliamentary groups and officials from the Spanish Ministries of Science and Innovation, and Universities.

Besides ample press coverage, this report led to us publishing brief pieces about our main recommendations in outlets like The Euroscientist and The Conversation Spain.

In March, we published our recommendations on open science policy as a peer-reviewed policy memo in the Journal of Science Policy and Governance, providing the Spanish Government with key strategy recommendations toward implementation of open science and open access.

With regard to **Brexit**, we took part in October in the "Ponencia para el estudio de las consecuencias derivadas de la salida del Reino Unido de la Unión **Europea"**, a joint Reporting sub-committee of Spain's Congress of Deputies and Senate. We used the opportunity to provide a briefing about consequences of the UK's exit from the EU, outlining challenges and opportunities that Brexit raises for Spain in the context of research.

We also remain vigilant about how Brexit impacts researchers looking to return to Spain. Specifically, we have provided guidance to members about **procedures for accreditation with ANECA**. We are in contact with the relevant entities and have seeked information about how protocols will change after Brexit, and about the situation faced by applications submitted in 2021 - which, as of April 2021, are pending until new regulations are in place.



10 keys for an improved R&D system



1. A cross-party agreement for R&D, to guarantee a stable long-term budget and its implementation regardless of political hues. This Agreement must also ensure the continuity of a single Ministry with competence in Science, Innovation and Universities, which must be equipped with adequate structures and staff.



Strengthening of the State Research Agency, especially in terms of staff, to improve its capacity for regular management of all public funding calls for R&D at the state level.



3. Increase and better monitoring of public investment in R&D, increasing the amount spent on direct grants and diversifying the funding model, with the aim of enhancing sponsorship and innovative activity within the private sector as well.



4. Design of a long-term national strategy, which in addition to defining priority R&D areas and objectives, provides financial stability to achieve these goals – with sufficient grant calls, which must be regular and timely.



5. Reduction of bureaucracy and bolstering of research support structures, both to identify funding and collaboration opportunities and to ease the administrative burden on researchers applying for grants or managing funded projects.



6. Creation and boost of structures that promote public-private research, in order to promote entrepreneurship and build synergies between public organisations and their private partners.



7. Support for a stable research career with accessible, verifiable and clear hiring and promotion criteria, through actions that prevent inbreeding and a merit evaluation in selection procedures, as well as salary improvements based on experience, skills and level of responsibility.



Internationalization of the Spanish R&D system, fostering interdisciplinary networks, improving attraction and retention of talent, and streamlining the accreditation and homologation procedures.



9. Promotion of research and science as a part of our cultural wealth, highlighting its role in both society and institutions through the enhancement of scientific communication and the transparency of research practice.



10. Advancement in diversity and equity, by reinforcing prevention and intervention in discrimination or harassment, promoting reconciliation policies and the removal of barriers due to gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, functional diversity, faith, race, social background or place of origin.

RAICEX



Officially established in July 2018, the Red de Asociaciones de Científicos e Investigadores Españoles en el Exterior (RAICEX) currently represents 18 associations, which together account for more than 4,000 Spanish researchers and scientists abroad.

Our joint mission is to promote the exchange of experiences and knowledge between Spanish researchers abroad and all the agents of the Spanish System of Science, Technology and Innovation, serving as an advisory body, as a channel of information, and a catalyst of international relations and multi-directional research, thus contributing to the progress of science and research. SRUK has actively worked to create this network for the past five years with the conviction that a framework that brings together all the counterpart associations strengthens our message and opens doors of collaboration that are very beneficial to all. RAICEX has achieved an important institutional recognition in Spain and in an effort to continue transmitting the concerns of our communities to the R&D agents in Spain, this year SRUK has collaborated with RAICEX in several actions:

- Briefing about the evaluation procedures to apply for a position as "cientifico titular" in the Spanish public research institutions (**Organismos Públicos de Investigación**, OPIs). Due to the Covid-19 pandemia, travelling was cancelled due to national lockdowns in many countries and therefore, we asked the Ministry of Science and Innovation to establish an online selection process for the researchers working abroad.
- Feedback to the "Deal for Science and Innovation". As official supporters of this document, the Spanish Ministry of Science and Innovation requested RAICEX views on this document. Our Department of Science Policy has been collaborating to help improve the national strategy for Science and Innovation in Spain, with special attention to the figure of tenure track and the transfer of technology.
- In collaboration with the **Cervantes Institute**, RAICEX has been part of the participants of a working group to foster science in Spanish ("**Ciencia en Español**"), in collaboration with the Ministry of Science and Innovation. SRUK helped highlighting the outreach events we have organised in our very own mother language during the past months.
- On the occasion of the International Day of Women and Girls in Science on the 11th of Frebruary, several of our volunteers participated with RAICEX and **ASEICA** (Asociación Española de Investigación en Cáncer) in the campaign named as "Get to know them" ("**Conócelas**"), telling about her research and personal passion.
- Participation on the first edition of the **Award ACES-Margarita Salas**. CERU has presented our nominee to this award, aiming to recognise internationally the research career of Spanish working abroad, who contribute to the progress and well-being of our society. The winner will be announced later in 2021.
- First joint event of all the associations that constitute RAICEX in collaboration with the Ramon Areces Foundation: "**Diálogos FRA-RAICEX**". On the 30th of June, the first event took place on the topic: Effects of the Covid-19 pandemic.

We, at SRUK, lived the days with great enthusiasm, delighted to be able to share future visions and common goals. We will continue working to represent the interests of the Spanish researchers in the United Kingdom.

SRUK/CERU continues to foster our relationship with other associations of European researchers in the UK (PARSUK, AISUK, **Polonium Foundation** and **DANinUK**) to explore the concerns and interests that our communities share. These relationships are particularly important in the context of Brexit, as we believe that collaborating with other associations representing European diasporas in the UK would make our message of supporting international collaborations and international researchers stronger. This year we signed together the **#DealforScience** petition, led by The Wellcome Trust, EU-LIFE and EuroScience to "Keep the EU and UK collaborating in science". On 24 December, the EU and UK secured a trade deal including the UK participation in Horizon Europe – crucial for the stability of scientific collaborations in Europe, the UK and beyond. This means that UK researchers will be able to apply for EU grants and can continue to be collaborative partners for EU researchers. This joint initiative showed the importance of demonstrating support from all Member States and the UK to make the case for continued EU-UK research collaboration.

In October, SRUK/CERU was also invited to the **EU delegation** meeting with representatives of **EU students** and researchers in the **UK** by Cyril Robin-Champigneul, (First Counsellor – Research and Innovation, EU Delegation to the United Kingdom). Eight invited associations, representing nationals of six EU countries, confirmed their participation, and so did all Education and Research Counsellors of the respective Member States, as well as from France and Germany, in addition to the Ambassador João Vale de Almeida. We exchanged information, views and suggestions about the impact that Brexit has had on our communities and discussed possible avenues for joint action.

We focus on some key aspects:

- **International agreements.** We facilitate collaborations and increase visibility of both Spanish and British research groups.
- International movement. We provide a connection platform and foster bidirectional mobility of researchers at different stages of their career enabling stronger relationships between the research groups.
- Career development. We organise workshops and seminars and we improve the career prospects of both visitor and supervisor in our mobility grants.
- **Networking and Information.** We organise networking activities and informative events. We study how Brexit affects research mobility, and in particular the implications on the programmes we offer, to support our members.

- International research mobility UK ↔ Spain. Manage mobility grants focused on training and collaborative placements for researchers at different stages of their careers (from undergraduates to non-permanent lecturers or researchers).
- Talent recruitment and networking opportunities. Create and support forum events to connect British, Spanish and European researchers and research groups to facilitate new collaborations for funding and job opportunities.
- **Professional development and awards.** Offer informative and training schemes that advise about alternative or complementary research pathways and enrich the CVs of our members.

EL DEPARTAMENTO DE RELACIONES INTERNACIONALES

SRUK/CERU tiene como un objetivo fundacional ser intermediaria en Ciencia e Investigación y para ello establece acuerdos con instituciones de investigación españolas. Con estos convenios estimulamos colaboraciones entre organizaciones e instituciones en España y Reino Unido, tanto privadas como públicas y facilitamos la movilidad entre ambos países.

Las iniciativas desarrolladas dentro del departamento de Colaboraciones Internacionales de SRUK/CERU engloban programas de movilidad para estudiantes e investigadores en diferentes estadíos de la carrera investigadora, oportunidades para la trasferencia de conocimiento y el desarrollo profesional, reclutamiento de talento y premios a la carrera investigadora.

2020/2021 Highlighted programmes and events

- 2nd edition On the Move Fellowships: On the Move is a bi-directional mobility programme designed for PhD and non-permanent research staff in Spain and in the UK in partnership with the Conference of Rectors of Spanish Universities (CRUE). This edition included research institutes with academic affiliation. Despite the pandemic, we awarded this year 8 placements in Wales, Scotland, Northern Ireland and England, from 16 opportunities. Placements in Spain remained vacant while eight researchers from Spanish Universities will enjoy a 3-month placement in the UK.
- **SRUK Summer Studentships:** This year's Winter Studentship call has been postponed and merged with the Summer Studentship, therefore 3 Spanish universities participated. At least 16 students have secured a 3-month placement in one of the 11 UK institutions with SRUK supervisors participating in the call. Many hosting groups are repeating every year, which shows how popular and satisfactory the programme is.
- Hosting group database: We are piloting a Supervisor and Hosting Group database for SRUK members. You can join the database by writing to our department and we will notify you when an opportunity for hosting a researcher is available in your area of expertise.

Future initiatives

- 2nd event on the SRUK Cancer Networking Series: This is a series of international symposiums to take place in the UK and Spain that aim to promote scientific discussion, networking and collaboration between UK, Germany and Spain-based cancer researchers and institutions. The second event will bring world-leading scientists in the fields of cancer genomics, immune system and paediatric cancer to the CNIO, Madrid. The day will alternate seminars, networking, mentoring activities and roundtables on science policy and funding opportunities. Our supporters are Fundación Ramon Areces, ASEICA and Mission Bio and we collaborate with CNIO and CERFA.
- Other: Expand On the Move and establish it as an annual programme. Organise a closing event for the OnTheMovers. Participate in the organisation and talks of CIENCIA UK 2021 together with other SRUK departments and constituencies. Develop short-stays grants to set initial meetings with potential collaborators. Establish new collaborations and maintain previous partnerships between Universities, Research Centres and certain public and private organizations related to R&D in the United Kingdom and Spain.

In February 2021, for the first time, the Board of Directors agreed to adapt the SRUK/CERU Travel Grants into the SRUK/CERU **Professional Development Grants**, to accomplished with the current international COVID-19 safety guidelines and restrictions, while still promoting the career development of its regular members. Thus, in this new 2021 edition, applications were accepted for **virtual** activities/events only.

The Professional Development Grants were divided into two different rounds, with the second call opening in August 2021. Ten grants of up to £200 were available for each round.

During the **first call**, 5 applications on diverse scientific areas were received. Since onsite meetings were again possible, £400-worth travel grants were also offered during the **second call**, for which 4 applications on different research fields were received. All members fulfilled the mandatory requested criteria and thus, SRUK awarded **nine members** a professional development grant.

These grants were aimed to help fund the cost of presenting their research outcomes at virtual international conferences, attending workshops, networking events or specialised virtual training courses, or to help organising and running online scientific events or meetings. All applications were required to respect and follow local, national, and international COVID-19 regulations.

MENTORING PROGRAMME

The uncertain situation experienced during last 2020 has contributed to reinforcing our conviction about the importance of additional and transferable skills for the development of a research career. In this context, SRUK Mentoring Programme benefits from the diverse range of members' skills and areas of research to support young Spanish researchers in the planning of a successful career path, either in Academy or industry.

Luckily, new technologies have allowed us to successfully carry out the 3rd edition. Nowadays, the Programme is running its 4th edition with more than 60 participants; 33% of the mentoring partners continue from past editions and the rest, around 66%, are new joiners.

The regular feedback received from participants along with the increasingly clear link that has been established between committee members, encourage us to work with enthusiasm in maintaining and improving the programme.

We are also very happy to observe that for the second consecutive year, the satisfaction of the programme is very high, with nobody giving us negative feedback on the programme and 80% of the participants considering it as "Good" or "Very Good". Our main objective is to establish rewarding relationships between mentor and mentee since those kinds of mentoring relationships provide satisfaction and benefits for them. Therefore, the mentors and mentees inputs have been building valuable examples of what a successful mentoring relationship may be and advice to overcome some of the situations that could arise during the relationship. To address that, in the committee we have been delivering activities, such as recurrent "virtual mentoring cafes" where mentors can share their experiences, always anonymously, that were highly successful in previous editions, as well as fresh ideas that will help mentors to improve their skills and be more helpful for the mentoring relationship.



"ANY SUFFICIENTLY ADVANCED TECHNOLOGI AS INDISTINGUISHABLE FROM MAGIC" (ACCOUNT

On Saturday morning, the inaugural session was led by our SRUK President, Dr Carmen Sánchez-Cañizares. There were also welcome speeches from Mr Miguel Oliveros, Minister Counsellor for Cultural and Scientific Affairs at the Embassy of Spain in the United Kingdom, Mr Raimundo Hernández, Director of the Ramón Areces Foundation, and Mr Javier Pardo Díaz, Chair of the Symposium. Right after, we started with the first session, titled "Magic perception and its role in history". The two keynote speakers were Prof Susana Martínez-Conde, Director of the Laboratory of Integrative Neuroscience at the State University of New York, and the archaeologist Prof Chris Gosden, from the University of Oxford. Prof Martínez Conde presented the neuroscientific basis of perception and its relationship with visual and cognitive illusions, whereas Prof Gosden focused on how magic, religion and science have shaped the image of the world we have.

After a virtual coffee break when attendees were able to chat among themselves, we attended the talk "Magic at the kitchen!". During this talk, **Prof Félix M. Goñi**, from the University

of the Basque Country, discussed the biophysical properties of food and how we make use of them during the cooking processes. There was also time for mentioning several interesting recipes and tasty dishes. With all this information in mind, we treated ourselves to a well-deserved lunch break. During this time, we had the **poster session**, where some SRUK members presented their research.

The session in the afternoon was a round table on ecology and climate crisis, moderated by our very own **Dr Pablo Muñoz Rodríguez** (University of Oxford). The three invited panellists were **Dr Daniel de Miguel** (University of Zaragoza), **Dr Imma Oliveras** (University of Oxford) and **Ms Paula Solascasas** (Autonomous University of Madrid). They managed to help us understand how ecosystems have fluctuated over time and still keep changing. Some of the topics discussed were the use of the fossil record to infer climate variations, the role of human action in wildfires and climate change, and some examples of how to maintain and manage natural ecosystems.

Later in the evening, we enjoyed the third edition of the **Science Zone**, which counted with different outreach activities. We learnt about marine animals and the role of women in science through history. We were also able to attend a storytelling session with the winners of the SRUK literary contest Science-me a Story, sponsored by the Lilly Foundation. Afterwards, we had some **networking activities** in which the attendees got to know each other's interests and even look for possible scientific collaborations.

On Sunday, we kicked off with the keynote talk by **Prof. Esther Rodríguez Villegas**, our SRUK Merit Award 2020. She highlighted the role of medical devices in preventing repenting death in patients with epilepsy, from their conception until their market release. On a more personal note, she also pointed out the main achievements in her professional career. After this inspiring talk, we moved on to the

research presentations by SRUK members. In line with the symposium theme, they acted as if they were minstrels explaining the magic component of their work. This session allowed the SRUK community to get to know the details of the work of other members.

To finalise the symposium, we had a series of workshops on science communication. The objective of these activities was to teach how to best deliver their research depending on the audience. We had a total of eight workshops organised by professionals, namely Collaboration journey academics-industry (by Jara Pascual), Communicating with policymakers (by **Leonor Sierra**), Science communication for children (by Sara Marques), Youtube and science: from paper to challenge (by Guillermo Pérez), How to Beat Digital Distraction and Writing for Productivity (by Andy Tattersall), Making science become news (by Adeline Marcos), Lasting impression: How to make a memorable presentation (by **Jamie** Gallagher), and How to shape science for social networks (by **Daniel Pellicer**). All the workshops were very engaging and highly valued by the attendees.

Overall, the VIII International Symposium SRUK/ CERU was very well received by the attendees and a great success according to the organisers. However, we cannot wait until next year when we can meet each other again. Hopefully, by then, it will be in person!



MERIT AWARD 2020

SRUK/CERU Merit Award 2021, recognising her remarkable career and her contributions to the development of low-power electronics, as well as her role as innovator and entrepreneur.

The Society of Spanish Researchers in the United Kingdom (SRUK/CERU) was pleased to announce the winner of the SRUK/CERU Merit Award. This award is aiming to recognise the career of an internationally renowned senior Spanish researcher based in the UK who has been instrumental to the advance of science. Candidates for this award are nominated every two years by members of SRUK/CERU, the SRUK/CERU Awards Committee and partner institutions. For the 2020 edition, postponed due to the Covid-19 health crisis, the awardee is Prof. Esther Rodriguez Villegas, Chair of Low Power Electronics at Imperial College London, Fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineering, director of Wearable Technologies Lab and founder of Acurable company, for her prolific and outstanding scientific career both in Spain and in the UK.

Prof. Rodriguez Villegas started her career studying Physics at the University of Seville, in the area of electronics, graduating first of her promotion. She completed her PhD at the same university in 2002. After finishing her PhD, Prof. Rodriguez Villegas joined Imperial College London, where she has developed over the years an exciting career in the Department of Electrical and Electronic Engineering. Her area of expertise, low power electronics, has driven her interests towards the development of wearable sensors for physiological monitoring and low-power

integrated circuits with a focus on healthcare applications. Over the years, she has balanced a prolific career as an academic, with intense activity in the area of innovation and technology transfer, backed up by multiple awards. Examples include two European Research Council Grants, Starting and Consolidator, an Innovation Award from

the Institution of Engineering and Technology (IET), an XPRI-ZE and, in 2020, the Silver Medal from the Royal Academy of Engineering, becoming an elected member of the Academy (FREng) in that same year. In addition to her academic career, Prof. Rodriguez Villegas has also had an intense activity in the industry. In 2016, she founded Acurable, a start-up that markets advanced wearable devices to accurately diagnose and monitor respiratory conditions. Among other things, Acurable has been named one of the 100 Most Disruptive Companies in the World (Disrupt100).

With this recognition, Prof. Rodriguez Villegas has also been awarded an honorary membership of the Society and she will become a distinguished adviser for SRUK/CERU. The president of SRUK/CERU, Dr Carmen Sánchez-Cañizares, highlights that "Prof. Rodriguez Villegas is a prime example of a world-leading Spanish researcher working in the UK. Her professional career represents a reference and role model for our members. As representatives of the community of Spanish researchers in the United Kingdom, SRUK/CERU is proud to recognise her outstanding career with our Merit Award".

In the words of Prof. Rodriguez Villegas "It is an honour to receive this unexpected award. It is truly emotional for me because, regardless of where I live or where I work, this is a Spanish award, and as such, it has a special meaning for me".

Dr Rodrigo Ledesma Amaro worked as a Marie Curie post-doctoral fellow at INRA (Institut national de la recherche agronomique, France) from 2014 to 2017, and joined Imperial College London (UK), in 2017, with a competitive fellowship to begin an independent research group, becoming a Lecturer in 2019. Rodrigo is currently investigating topics at the interface of Synthetic Biology and Metabolic Engineering. He has developed new synthetic biology tools to understand and manipulate metabolic pathways such as multiplexed CRISPR technologies, Golden

Gate libraries of DNA parts, or genome-scale metabolic models, which are now used worldwide in industry and academia. He has worked in different metabolic pathways, including the identification of novel target metabolic genes for the overproduction of vitamin B2 (riboflavin), which have been patented and are now used by BASF to produce 60% of the worldwide production of this vitamin. This

research led him to create the start-up CorNatural, founded in 2019, which has received investment from SOSV. Another important contribution to the research field is the development of a patented method to generate the largest gRNAs arrays for multiplexing CRISPR ever described, which allows the manipulation of up to 24 genes in a single transformation. The novelty of his approach has been supported by numerous grants accounting for more than £3.5M, including the prestigious ERC starting grant.

Rodrigo will use the Award money for multiple purposes; i) boosting sustainability by the dissemination of his research and promoting the involvement of his department in the LEAF initiative, a UK-wide program that recognises efforts in reducing waste and energy, plastics and water consumption; ii) dissemination of his research by the creation of a podcast via Researchpod, and the participation in outreach events like the Great Exhibition Road Festival or the New Scientist Live; iii) cover expenses of visiting PhD and MSc students from Spain, services fees for the use of equipment not covered by other grants and attending a training course about single cell RNA sequencing analysis.

EMERGING TALENT 2021

Recognising and fostering Spanish talent in the UK

We are very pleased to have launched the sixth edition of the SRUK Emerging Talent Award, supported by Fundación Banco Santander under its "Young Talent" programme. The aim of this award is to recognise and support a promising junior Spanish researcher who has developed her/his career in the United Kingdom.

The prize consists of £14 000 to be invested in the development of the awardee's career, on aspects such as research-related tasks, dissemination of recent results, specialised training, or conciliation arrangements. This award also seeks to increase the visibility of the winner's research within both the Spanish and British societies.



The 3rd edition of Science-me a Story has been a great success besides the circumstances. We have received more than 200 scientific stories from all over the world. For the first time, the number of entries in the English category has been like the Spanish category. Thanks to the continued sponsorship from Fundación Lilly and the collaboration with Principia, together with the high participation and the jury support, Science-me a story is starting to be a consolidated scientific writing contest.

The stories have been published in the on-line Principia magazine and the Literature and Science Hub (University of Liverpool). The winners have received a monetary price as well as an edited book with the 2020 winning stories. For this edition, we have not organized an award ceremony, but we prepared a video with short interviews to meet the authors of the awarded stories.

Annual Report 2021

This year, we have started different initiatives to make the stories accessible for children, teachers and families. **Dibuja-me un cuento** took place during the lockdown, kids participated through Facebook, and the winner got a Principia Kids subscription. We also uploaded the winning stories from the three editions to our Youtube channel. In these **audio stories**, the authors read their own stories, and volunteer illustrators have animated them. We have been amazed by the beautiful illustrations and the collaborative effort between the authors and the illustrators. We also have started to create some **teaching units** with Claire Culliford to provide supporting material for the stories, mainly when used at primary school.

We have also established further collaborations to use the scientific stories in other activities. With **SRUK Women in Science** we are working with primary schools towards changing the scientist stereotypes through the stories, as most of the authors and main characters of the stories are women. We have also launched a **series of storytelling** with the Instituto Cervantes de Manchester. During this online sesion, Claire Culliford is reading the stories from both categories and is also organising some activities for the children to better understand the scientific concepts. The first storytellings are covering the topic of vaccines according to the current pandemic situation. We have more sessions planned for next year and the intention that other Intitutos Cervantes will join the initiative.

And finally, we are happy to announce that Fundación Lilly has given us the support to edit a **digital book** with all Science-me a story winning stories. Fundación Lilly believes that the SRUK scientific writing contest is a powerful initiative to communicate science. Together with the **Penguin** book publishing company, we have worked with authors and volunteer illustrators to prepare **the first Science-me a story book**. It will be an on-line edition which will be free and accessible to everyone from the Fundación Lilly website. A certain number of books will be printed and distributed to institutions related to science communication. We have been very excited about this opportunity and have worked hard to have it ready for next year. We believe this book will open many new adventures for Science-me a story.

In 2020, the Cambridge and North West constituencies collaborated to organise for the first time the SRUK/CERU photography competition "Investigación en Foco".

The main objective was to allow the SRUK/CERU members and friends to express and reinforce the need and beauty of daily research through images. An important part of the competition was to make the research more accessible to a broad audience. Each participant was able to submit a single photograph to capture any particular theme in any research field, including Mathematics, Biology, Medicine and Health, Chemistry, Ecology and Environmental Science, Physics, Astronomy, Engineering Technology, Humanities, Arts, Social Sciences and Science Communication.

We had the collaboration of an external panel of eight members with different backgrounds such as photography, public engagement and Science and History, among others. They marked a total of 25 photographs. out of which 3 with the highest marks were the winners corresponding to the 3 categories of the contest: originality, technique, and research communication. There was a $4^{\rm th}$ winner who was elected by the SRUK/CERU members and friends via e-vote.

On October 28, 2020, we had the pleasure to celebrate the online Awards Ceremony. We exhibited the 12 shortlisted photographs. Each author had the opportunity to explain the art, science and beauty of their work to a numerous audience. The 4 winners corresponding with each category were announced and awarded £100 each!

Finally, we gifted the authors with a 2021 Calendar made with the 12 photographs shortlisted by the external panel of experts. These photographs are exposed on the Investigación en Foco section of our website.

In 2021, we were delighted to present the second edition of "Investigación en Foco"! In addition, this year we organised the "From images to science stories" workshop in collaboration with Helena Gonzalez, director and co-founder of Big Van Science. The workshop aimed to improve the research communication and languages skills to emphasize the beauty of the research. This workshop was the first of several related to public engagement and science designing.

WOM=N EQUITY & RESEARCH

Day of Woman and Girl in Science. 11th February

To celebrate this day, we have delivered online talks to promote Science, Higher Education studies and careers in STEM among Spanish primary and high-school students.

In collaboration with "Science-me a Story", we coordinated five online workshops in Spanish schools to bring Science to children using tales which highlight the role of female scientists. We aim to repeat the experience with English schools in future.



To promote Women in Science, we helped disseminate the video created by the Spanish Embassy and the Instituto Cañada Blanch where the students were filmed asking ques-

tions to Dr Susana García, winner of the Talento Emergente award whose research is focused on climate change.

Research in Education

In collaboration with Science-me a Story committee, we would like to test whether stories are better tools to awake scientific vocations rather than the video we were using in our previous project "Awakening vocations". We expect to get the first results analysed by the end of the summer.

Following the success of the "Awakening vocations" project in Spain, we are developing this project in the UK. The results obtained in both countries will be summarised and compared in a scientific report to analyse whether the cultural background is playing a significant role in girls pursuing careers in the STEM field.

Our committee is part of the Women committee of RAICEX (Red de Asociaciones de Investigadores y Científicos Españoles en el Exterior). We aim to bring the Survey on Gender that our committee has run in Spain with very interesting results recently published in PlosOne to other countries in the world.

We have submitted several abstracts to the 11th European Conference on Gender Equality in Higher Education. The first abstract, in collaboration with RAICEX, shows the differences among different countries in reaching equality in Academia. The second abstract, this time in collaboration with CERFA (Cientificos Españoles en la Republica Federal Alemana), analyses the relationship between gender and motility, with a special focus on the return of scientists to Spain due to the pandemic.

Promoting gender equity and diversity in research

The main objective of the committee is to promote gender equity and diversity in research through:

- raising awareness of the role of women in research
- promoting of women's professional development
- supporting work-life / family balance.

Events 2020/2021

Events 2020/2021

The SRUK/CERU Scottish delegation has held a wide range of events during the 2020/2021 period, mostly focusing on highlighting the importance of science communication in times of the COVID19 pandemic.

This year we kickstarted **Communicate-in-YouTube**, which aims to work with youtubers and influencers to engage the public with different research areas. The event was very successful, with 1000 participants in the live session and more than 100.000 views on the YouTube video.

We celebrated our **Welcome Event 2020** as an online event where we had fun playing board games. We also spent an entertaining Sunday evening playing **Among us** just after the Christmas break

To learn how to engage the audience with our science, and to increase our visual and oral science communication skills, we organised the online workshop **How to get your science out there?** Cristina Gallego talked about graphic design basics to better organise information. While Ana Payo Payo focused on public speaking skills using story-telling techniques. The event was sold-out and we are planning to organise a second edition during the second half of 2021.

For a second year in a row the quiz organised with Goose's Quizzes to celebrate the **International Day of Women and Girls in Science** was a total success and the participants were eager to learn about the amazing roles of women in science throughout history and have a good time.

Due to the online nature of the events, we have also been joining forces with other constituencies to bring events to broader audiences. Together with the London Constituency, we organised a series of talks and workshops centered around **cryptography and cybersecurity**. Juanjo Mata, an expert in Cybersecurity, collaborated with the Scottish constituency bringing a **CTF** -"Capture The Flag"- workshop. The attendees were required to learn about different cybersecurity concepts, issues and vulnerabilities, to pass a series of challenges.

Plans 2021/2022

Besides exciting new initiatives, we plan to organise the events that have been postponed due to the pandemic, like **Jings! Science left the toon**, the first science festival held in one of the most deprived areas of Glasgow, and our seminar series **Science connect**, which will be organised for the first time in collaboration with the Edinburgh Spanish Film Festival.

Events 2020/2021

The Cambridge constituency rapidly adapted to the new way of running events and kickstarted the year with the online event **Opciones Académicas de Retorno a España** (academic options to return to Spain) with the participation of seven speakers. The 20th of January, we organised an event under the name of "Journey to the Centre of the Bodleian", where Virginia M. Lladó-Buisán, Head of Conservation and Collection Care at the Bodleian Library, explained one of the fundamental activities that the renowned Bodleian Library performs: ancient book and manuscript conservation. To commemorate the International Day of Women and Girls in Science in February, we organised a "Virtual Tour of Women Pioneers in Oxford", in which Carmen Sánchez Cañizares and Laura Martínez Maestro took us through emblematic sites in Oxford linked with women pioneers in science and the arts. In March, with the aim of giving SRUK members the chance to meet like-minded Spanish researchers working in Oxford, we organised a social "Virtual Cañas" event. In April, we put together an event under the name of "Perspectives on Pregnancy, Childbirth and Early Motherhood". Through this event, Stella Villarmea (philosopher), Annabelle Frost (obstetrician) and Jodi Pawluski (neuroscientist) presented and discussed their different perspectives on the topic. Finally, in May we celebrated a mini-symposium in the park where some of our members presented their research to the audience in an informal and social setting.

During this year we have also organised, alongside the Cambridge and Yorkshire constituencies, the "Alternatives to Academia" event series. They focused on entrepreneurship, translational science, and careers in patents and intellectual property.

Plans 2021/2022

With the loosening of the restrictions, we are planning to organise in-person scientific seminars, documentary screenings, and social events.

Plans 2021/2022

We are organising a social event on the 3rd of July in order to bring together new members to the constituency, especially focused on the students and researchers of the West Yorkshire universities. We are hoping to be able to organise a face-to-face "Beers in the pub" event, according to the "Road map out of COVID" of the UK government.

Events 2020/2021

The board of directors of the constituency was elected and renewed in July 2020, being all formed by members of the University of Bradford. This was followed by a virtual welcome event on the 4^{th} October 2020 ("Welcome to Yorkshire") to introduce the society to new members and to play some online games for the rest of the evening.

This year, the constituencies of Yorkshire and London jointly organised the Christmas webinar **Science and Cooking: Science, technique and history around bread & beer**, chaired by Elisabet Batlle (Director of Yorkshire Constituency), and presented by Patricia Jurado (researcher on Science & Cooking and Teaching fellow at Harvard University) and David Santamaria (Research & Development Specialist technician at Mahou). They delivered an amazing presentation about the ancient techniques developed to produce bread and beer, followed up by a Q&A time where they answered attendees' questions.

The Constituency also participated in the series **Alternatives to Academia**, alongside the constituencies of Oxford, Cambridge and Yorkshire. Within this series, we have organised three different webinars: A conversation with entrepreneurs, an event about Knowledge Transfer Partnerships (KTP), and a "Patents and Scientific Advocacy" webinar. More sessions are being planned as part of the series.

On the 17th of December, SRUK Yorkshire participated in a virtual meeting with the newly established Spanish consulate in Manchester, alongside the directors of the other constituencies under its demarcation. The meeting comprised a presentation of both SRUK and the functions of the consulate and it can be found in the Spanish Manchester consulate's Youtube channel. In collaboration with the SRUK Northwest & Cambridge constituencies and the Instituto Cervantes (IC) Manchester & Leeds, we brought back the CineScience series with the online documentary "La mujer que soñaba con los números" (Sintregua productions). This documentary was available on the IC Youtube channel during a week prior to the debate, which took place on the 15th of April 2021. We were honoured with the precious collaboration of Mirella R. Abrisqueta, the director of the documentary, and the Spanish mathematicians and lecturers Marta Macho, Conchita Martínez and Raquel Villacampa.

In addition, SRUK Yorkshire created an SRUK Instagram channel (@srukceru) and committee. This is a new SRUK initiative for which we are seeking for new members to join and promote this channel in the following year.

This year we also said farewell to Antonio De La Vega, former SRUK secretary, who has moved back to Spain. We want to truly thank Antonio for his contribution to the society. Best of luck, Antonio!

Events 2020/2021

We are really excited about the initiatives launched this year! In September, we had an **online welcome event** where working group members and new friends could enjoy a nice chat after this difficult summer. It's been really difficult to organize events this year due to social restrictions, so it was a huge success to adapt one of our most famous events to this situation. In April, we were delighted to present the return of **CineScience**, this time in an online format & in collaboration with the Instituto Cervantes Manchester and Leeds.

The event was focused on raising awareness of the role of women in research and science through the documentary "La mujer que soñaba con números", which is the feature-length film that portrays her life and her development in Spanish Enlightenment society. The documentary was available for 7 days on the Instituto Cervantes Manchester YouTube Channel, including English subtitles so we could reach a broader audience. This event also included a synchronous session consisting of a roundtable discussion with the valuable collaboration of the director Mirella R. Abrisqueta and 3 mathematicians, in order to comment and discuss the role of women in maths, today and along history. The mathematicians that joined us in this fantastic discussion about the role of Women in Science were Raquel Villacampa Guitérrez, professor at the Centro Universitario de la Defensa de Zaragoza and general secretary of the Real Sociedad Matemática Española, Marta Macho Stadler, professor at the mathematics faculty of the UPV/EHU and science communicator, and Concepción Ma Martínez Pérez, professor at the mathematics faculty of the Universidad de Zaragoza.

All our events were possible thanks to generous contributions from Fundación Ramón Areces, OCSA and Fundación Lilly, and to the collaboration with the Instituto Cervantes Manchester.

Plans 2021/2022

Sadly, the year 2021 will be remembered for the coronavirus pandemic and the long confinement measures it caused. We had to postpone some of the events we were planning until life gets back to normal. Luckily, we are able to continue with the 2nd edition of the SRUK/CERU photography competition, "Investigación en Foco". Once restrictions are removed and it is safe to organize social gatherings again, we will organize trips to discover the North-West region of this country and to build the sense of community that was sadly lost because of this pandemic situation. Finally, we will continue organising more CineScience events, where we will project a film/documentary to bring different current science problems closer to everyone and raise awareness about certain topics.


ECONOMIC REPORT

SRUK is a private company limited-by-guarantee operating as a non-profit society. Over the last years, our Society has experienced a huge growth in the number of events and initiatives. Although we count with our SRUK membership fees, all our activities would not be possible without the additional economic support from external sources.

We report in this annual memory the full economic year of 2020, which starts in January and finishes in December 2020. During the year 2020, the SRUK Board of Directors presented several funding proposals and applied to specific calls to public and private institutions, and it is thanks to our supporters that SRUK has been able to develop an ambitious range of activities. Our main supporters were Fundación Banco Santander contributing 28,3 % to our income, and Ramón Areces Foundation contributing 20,3 %. We also had continuous support from Fundación Lilly and the Office for Cultural and Scientific Affairs (OCSA) of the Embassy of Spain in London. This year, for the first time, we had our own source of income from the administrative work we do for the OnTheMove biennial programme (13.7%). This has resulted in an increased income with respect to last year.


At SRUK, we continue operating with an **efficient economic policy**, that is, we try to make the most out of the income received. This has been an unusual year for everyone, with unexpected challenges and a global public health crisis that has changed our ways of working and with **many of our activities postponed to the foreseeable future** once the restrictions are lifted, which is reflected in our expenditure, as we have designated a budget for several initiatives which has not been used during 2020 but it will in 2021.

Annual Report 2021

After a very challenging year, with all our onsite events cancelled due to the pandemic and the United Kingdom's loss of attractiveness for EU researchers caused by the post Brexit visa system and studentship fees, we still have grown in number of members. However, the lockdown and the lack of onsite events have produced a slowdown in volunteer renewal that is affecting the load of work of committees and working groups. Our main priority is to put all our efforts into engaging with our SRUK members at local events to guarantee the medium and long term sustainability of the Society.

Moreover, 2022 represents an excellent opportunity to re-engage with the community, as SRUK will celebrate 10 years since our establishment, and events onsite and online will be held to commemorate this date, including our first onsite International Symposium since 2019.

This Foundation is committed to supporting cultural, humanistic, social projects and scientific initiatives. Their support to Science focuses on the promotion of three aims: the development of projects in the most innovative research fields; the organisation of Science outreach activities; and the commitment to foster the career development of young

talents via the concession of grants and funding programmes. SRUK/CERU is delighted to have received the support of Fundación Banco Santander for Six consecutive years. In 2021, together we launched the sixth edition of the SRUK/CERU Emerging Talent Award. With this award, we want to recognise the work of a young Spanish researcher who has developed her/his career in the UK.





Collaboration with the Office for Culture and Scientific Affairs (OCSA)

The Spanish Embassy in the UK was the first Embassy to formally perform Science Diplomacy by including this competence in its Office for Cultural and Scientific Affairs (OCSA). This Office aims to promote stronger links between Spanish and British scientific institutions. SRUK/CERU counts with the

collaboration of OCSA from its very beginning. This year, SRUK has again received support from the Embassy that would allow SRUK/CERU to develop activities and strategies in order to make this society a reference in foreign scientific associations in the UK. This institutional collaboration has also been crucial to reach both Spanish and British institutions and to promote SRUK activities. Regarding Brexit, the collaboration of the Spanish Embassy has been paramount to keep SRUK members informed of new developments on this subject, including the application for settled status and our rights as European citizens in the UK.





Created in 2001, the **Spanish Foundation for Science and Technology (FECYT)** is a public foundation dependent on the Spanish Ministry of Science, Innovation and Universities. FECYT mission is to enhance the link between science and society, and to promote open and inclusive science as well as scientific culture and education. In this context, FECYT

collaborates with the different Societies of Spanish Researchers abroad, including SRUK/CERU. As part of this collaboration, FECYT has participated in the organisation of SRUK/CERU outreach activities and events since 2012, including the SRUK Annual Symposium in which FECYT has been participating for the last six years.



Since 2001, the **Lilly Foundation** main aim has been to contribute to excellence in Science and Medicine in Spain. They achieve this through activities focused on the promotion of Science, Medicine, and Humanistic Medicine. In their framework of commitment to outreach and communicating Science, the Lilly Foundation has committed again its support to the program "DIVULGA" of SRUK/CERU. This outreach initiative focuses on the promotion of scientific vocations in children and young people. For this, the

program DIVULGA decontextualized the knowledge acquisition and involved adults in the activities in order to potentiate impact.
